**Field trips:** (Sunday, May 1) Please indicate your interest early. Lucero Canyon rock art and El Camino Real both require landowner permission (currently being obtained). Sign up sheets will be at the registration table during the meetings. All field trips are subject to change.

**1) Lucero Canyon Rock Art Site:** about 25 miles north of Las Cruces has Archaic and Mogollon panels. The group limit = 25 persons and 10 vehicles. Access requires a four-wheel drive vehicle to cross arroyos. 8:00 AM to noon, car-pooling required.

**2) Fort Selden State Monument:** About 20 miles north of Las Cruces was established in 1861 to protect settlers and travelers from the Apache. Self-guided visits include a living history demonstration and tour of the museum. and remains of adobe buildings and a rock jail. From 8:30 AM. The \$3.00 admission fee is reduced for NM residents on Sunday. **3) El Camino Real:** A segment of the EL Camino Real is visible in the southern part of the Jornada del Muerto, near Upham. Portions of the trail can be seen and walked. Access from I-25 near Rincon to an unpaved dirt road maintained by Doña Ana and Sierra counties. North bound people return to I-25 by going north to Engle and Truth or Consequences. 8 AM to noon.

**4) Walking Tour of La Mesilla:** focuses on the history and architecture this National Register property. Important events there include signing the Gadsden Purchase, occupation by the Confederate Army, and trial of Billy the Kid. Time: TBA, see: <http://www.oldmesilla.org>

**ASNM BOARD of TRUSTEES MEETING (February 5, 2005)**

The meeting was held at NM Tech in Socorro. Reports by the Executive Secretary and Treasurer noted basic stability in the business affairs of the Society.

---

**Scholarships:** Sheila Brewer reported on four applications for up to \$2000 in scholarships to be awarded this year. Donations to the two scholarship funds remained steady with Ted Frisbie (as usual) the big donor. A silent auction at the Annual Meeting will add to scholarship funds.

**Honoree Volumes - 2005 and 2006:** Regge Wiseman reported that the 2005 volume honoring the Natalie and Richard Woodbury is on schedule. The Board voted by secret ballot to honor two other Southwestern anthropologists, Charlotte and Ted Frisbie, with the 2006 volume.

**Certification Committee:** Roger Moore reported approval of the revised Rock Art Module. The next meeting of the committee will be at the Annual Meeting in Las Cruces (TBA).

**History & Archives:** Joan Mathien is preparing the ASNM Chaco papers for archival deposit at the Laboratory of Anthropology in Santa Fe.

**Achievement Award:** Tina Joslin reported on nominations for the ASNM Achievement Award. The qualifications of six worthy candidates were discussed and one was selected by the slimmest of margins in a secret ballot by the Board. The award will be given at the Annual meeting

**ASNM Newsletter:** Executive Secretary Dolores Sundt submitted results of the mail-in vote by the membership to select a new name for this newsletter. **“La Jornada”** won by a modest landslide. All those who suggested the name please submit your priority claim to the editors for adjudication. The winner of the New-Name award will be recognized at the Banquet on April 30.

**Rock Art Recording:** Jerry Brody reported that ASNM Rock Art Field School received \$1,152 in gifts including \$525 for the Jay Crotty Memorial and \$500 from the Friends of Archaeology. RAFS was also awarded a NM Historic Preservation Division grant to record rock art in the Galisteo Basin. It will join with the Office of Archaeological Studies and the Friends of Archaeology in this effort. About 25 new volunteers participated in RAFS training sessions in January and February. **Affiliate societies wanting to do rock art recording should contact the Brody’s through “La Jornada” to arrange for training.** Jean Brody reported that the final reports on the 7-year recording project at Creston in the southern Galisteo Basin is almost ready for submission to the ARMS archive where it will be available to qualified researchers.

**Nominations:** John Hayden presented a slate of 7 candidates for four open Board seats and three alternate positions. (See below for biographical sketches and ballots).

**State Archaeologist:** Glenna Dean reported that the 2005 Archaeological Fair will be in Sept. or Oct. in southeastern New Mexico. Tijeras Pueblo and Summerford Mountain and Ranch at NMSU are in process of being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places.

#### **"It's Never Over 'til It's Over" Said the Yogi, Take 1: Petroglyph National Monument**

In February, a coalition including the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Sage Council, SW Organizing Project, Sierra Club, SW Network for Environmental and Economic Justice and NMAC brought suit against Mayor Martin Chavez and the City of Albuquerque over plans to extend a road, Paseo del Norte, through Petroglyph National Monument. The lawsuit filed in state district court claims among other issues that the City failed to comply with the NM Prehistoric and Historic Sites Preservation Act.

#### **New Mexico's "Most Endangered Places" in 2005**

The NM Heritage Preservation Alliance named eight more "places" (including the teaching of history as one) as endangered. Petroglyph National Monument is on the list.

#### **Tim Seaman Retires as ARMS Manager**

The new manager of ARMS (Archaeological Records Management Section of the NM Historic Preservation Division) is archaeologist Bill Doleman. Seaman retired last September after a long, successful tenure during which he automated the archaeological database and site location maps for the 150,000 or so archaeological sites recorded under the LA system begun in the early 1930s at the Laboratory of Anthropology. Doleman, former Project Manager at UNM's Office of Contract Archaeology is an expert investigator of space alien crash sites near Roswell.

An appeal of a ruling against them by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, allowing scientific examination of the 9300-hundred-year-old "Kennewick Man" skeleton, was recently brought by the Nez Perce Tribe, Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation and Yakama Indian Nation, which claim Kennewick Man as an aboriginal ancestor.

### **NECROLOGY**

**Arthur Hudson White, Feb. 9, 1926 - Jan. 29, 2005:** Arthur H. White graduated from Pennington Boys School, then attended the University of New Mexico, earning a degree in anthropology in 1949. He also learned silversmithing then from one of the leading Navajo smiths in that city, David H. Taliman. The craft became a lifelong hobby.

He began a career in the National Park service in 1950 as a ranger at Montezuma Castle, going from there in 1953 to Chaco Canyon, where he was the acting superintendent, then as chief ranger to Bandelier, to superintendent at Navajo National Monument. After an assignment with the Job Corps, in 1968 he became assistant to the regional director for cooperative activities in Santa Fe, and in 1971 was named general superintendent of the Navajo Lands Group in Farmington. He retired in 1983 to Oracle, AZ. Art took special interest in seeing that Native Americans enjoyed equal opportunities in the NPS. He hired many Navajo workers some of whom went on to help professionalize the Navajo Nation Parks and Recreation Department.

He was preceded in death by his first wife, artist Mas Schweitzer, who died in 1962. Survivors include his wife Mary Huskey White, son Thomas D. White, step-children and grand-children. A memorial was held for him on February 19 in Tucson. Gifts in his memory may be sent to Girls and Boys Town, c/o Father Val J. Peters, Boys Town NE 68101.(David Brugge).

### ASNM BOARD of TRUSTEE CANDIDATES FOR 2005

**Bradley Bowmans** began his archaeological career as a bioarchaeology student at Texas A&M University. His archaeological interests also include cultural resource management and public education. He came to New Mexico in 1993 to found an institution that directly confronts problems that threaten archaeological resources and now directs the Museum of Archaeology and Material Culture in Cedar Crest, NM. Museum volunteers, under his direction, conduct educational programs and the museum is also involved in a long-term research and preservation projects in western NM including site surveys, ruins stabilization, excavation, analysis of human skeletal remains and developing a new cemetery for displaced human remains. He received a NM Heritage Preservation Award in 2002 for his work with human remains and for museum projects in Bernalillo and Cibola Counties. He conducts archaeological investigations in New Mexico under an Annual Human Burial Permit and is a contract archaeologist, lithic illustrator and analyst of lithic materials and faunal and human remains. He is President and principal advisor for cultural and natural resource protection of Pine Meadows Ranches, a subdivision in Cibola County.

**Carol J. Condie** holds a Ph.D. in anthropology from UNM and has been involved in anthropological, historical, and cultural resources management in the Southwest for 30 years. She was a member of the Glen Canyon Archeological Project at the University of Utah in the 1960s and in the 1970s was Education Coordinator and Director of the Division of Interpretation at the Maxwell Museum of Anthropology and an Assistant Professor of Anthropology at UNM. She has been president of Quivira Research Center since 1978 and owner of Quivira Research Associates since 1983. She is completing a three-year term as a Trustee of the Archaeological Society of New Mexico, and chairs the sub-committee that selects ASNM Honorees. She is a past-president of the NM Archeological Council and chaired the joint Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Archeological Resources Planning Advisory Committee. She has served as a seminar leader for Crow Canyon Archeological Field Seminars, as president of the Albuquerque Archeological Society and member of the Historic Preservation Division Archeology Fair Committee. She is currently on the Board of Directors of The Archaeological Conservancy..

**Anne Francis** is completing a three-year term on the ASNM Board of Trustees and serves as its secretary. She is past-president of the Albuquerque Archeological Society and a current member of their Board of Trustees. With her husband Jack, she led a group including National Park Service personnel and volunteers from ASNM and the Albuquerque Archeological Society in a massive seven-year project to record all of the rock art in Petroglyph National Monument. For that work, she and Jack were honored by ASNM in 2002 with its Archaeological Achievement Award. She worked also on the recently completed seven-year project of the Rock Art Field School of ASNM at Creston (Comanche Gap) and is currently working on another long-term rock art recording project elsewhere in the Galisteo Basin, jointly sponsored by ASNM, the New Mexico Office of Archaeological Studies and their support group, the Friends of Archaeology.

**Meade F. Kemrer** is a professional archaeologist with an MA in anthropology (Temple University) and a PhD in archaeology from the University of AZ. His interests focus on the American Southwest and he taught anthropology and archaeology at Arizona and at Wilkes College. New Mexico has been his home since 1977 and he has done cultural resource management throughout the state. He is a member of SAA, y, ASNM, NM Archeological Council, and the El Paso Archeological Society and represents cultural resources on the Bureau of Land Management NM Advisory Board. He is President-elect of the New Mexico Archeological Council. He is recently retired, lives in Las Cruces and does archaeological field research in south central and southwestern New Mexico and magnetometer studies that apply to archaeology. He has been an ASNM Trustee and is a member of its Certification Council.

**Doris Morgan** has been an active member of ASNM since 1997 serving on both its Board of Trustees and Certification Council. She earned Provisional Certification as a Rock Art Surveyor, Lab Technician and Field Crew Member. While President of the Doña Ana Archeological Society (1994-1997) she directed the organization of the 1997 ASNM Annual Meeting in Las Cruces. She co-authored/edited the history of the Doña Ana Society published in the 2000 ASNM Annual Volume, presented a paper at the ASNM Annual Meeting in El Paso (1995) and participated in the DAAS rock art recording project at Summerford Mountain. She directed DAAS members in reconstructing Mimbres pottery from Elk Ridge for Human Systems Research, Inc. and catalogued and analyzed artifacts from Elk Ridge and Rayado for that organization. She also taught pottery reconstruction at the Doña Ana Branch Community College for the Kent Museum of NM State University. She has excavated sites in New Mexico, New Jersey, Majorca and Israel, and has been an Earthwatch lecturer at universities, museums and other organizations since 1985.

**Cheryl Muceus** received a BA in Anthropology at California State University at Chico and an MA at the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley. She has worked in Cultural Resource Management and as an

archaeologist for both the Carson and Santa Fe National Forest. Cheryl started working for the Florence Hawley Ellis Museum of Anthropology at Ghost Ranch Conference Center as an assistant curator in 1985. and is currently the Curator of that museum and director of both it and Ghost Ranch paleontology museum. She coordinates an annual two-week archaeology seminar at Ghost Ranch and is the Community Education coordinator for that institution.
